



IMMEDIATE CHANGES IN TRAINING CLINICS (REPRINT)

First and most important, everyone who plans on using game birds at clinics must respond to my email requests. Typically I send out an email the week before a training day asking what birds are wanted. Please respond back to me by the deadline stated in the email. Everyone should ensure that Jessica Barker our membership coordinator, and Dennis Swett the newsletter editor have your updated email address.

Secondly, there are two new procedures that will go into effect this year. Training day check-ins will be priority based. Anyone that did not pre-order birds will not be able to sign in until all those that pre-ordered have done so. There usually are a few extra birds that are available for those that did not pre-order but their availability *cannot* be guaranteed. We will be using a multi copy sign-in form and copies will be given to the bird trailer, bird planters, & field trainer. The bird trailer will be restricted to one or two designated volunteers and they will be the only ones to take birds out of the trailer. The trailer volunteer will give the birds to the bird planters and to those who have purchased extra birds.

Lastly, the running order will be set at sign-in and volunteers running dogs will go to the head of the list. I ask that everyone respect and follow the running order. If an issue occurs, please see me or the volunteer field trainer.



Merrimack Chapter is hosting a NAVHDA Handlers' Clinic

@ Sharp's Farm

Hopkinton NH

May 16-17, 2015

A Handler's Clinic is an educational tool developed by NAVHDA to help dog owners and handlers understand the testing system. The clinics are conducted by designated trained leaders; all of whom are NAVHDA Senior Judges. During the two-day clinic weekend, participants experience all aspects of a Natural Ability, Utility Preparatory and Utility Test. The first few hours of each day are devoted to informal classroom instruction. There is discussion of test mechanics, the scoring system and NAVHDA philosophy.

The group then goes to the field to judge and score dogs being run in the actual test process. After each dog has been run and scored, there is a discussion of performance and scoring as observed by the participants and the clinic leader. The discussion includes strengths or weaknesses of training and handling observed in the demonstrations, and how they may have affected the dog's inherited skills.

If you would like to get into the apprentice program to become a judge, then you need to attend a Handlers' Clinic.

Wikipedia definition of "checklist"

A checklist is a type of informational job aid used to reduce failure by compensating for potential limits of human memory and attention. It helps to ensure consistency and completeness in carrying out a task. A basic example is the "to do list."

THE HUNTER'S CHECKLIST

People's lives depend on checklists. Careers have been defined by how well they used one- or not. But you? You don't find check lists necessary. They are for forgetful and disorganized people. But then again, on last year's hunting trip you forgot to change the chokes in your shotgun and hunted opening day of woodcock with your favorite turkey choke. Or perhaps you forgot to put the dog's spare leash in your vest. Or you didn't bring dog water to the dog club training day. And let's face it you are getting older and more picky. When you were 20, hunting woodcock with a full choke was funny and now it gets on your nerves. And who has time to get ready for a hunting trip by first having to think about what to bring?


So just perhaps you might consider using a checklist. A 30 year career in the fire service causes you to like checklists. As an incident commander I relied on checklists. I had checklists for structure fires, for fires in multi-story buildings, for hazardous materials accidents, for mass casualty incidents, for major forest and ground cover fires. When a firefighter becomes trapped in a burning building, or lost in the structure, that is not the time to have to think of all the steps necessary to effect rescue and in what order they need to be executed. When, after 30 years in the fire service, I transitioned into homeland security and emergency management I relied even more on check lists. We had separate checklists for different types of major weather events, human-caused disasters and for standing up the state emergency operations center. We had notification checklists for who got called in the middle of the night for at least 50 emergency scenarios.

Pilots, mechanics and surgeons are not dummies or forgetful people and they rely on checklists. They use them every day. Checklists are designed to prevent failure. Atul Gawande, in his book, [The Checklist Manifesto](#), says checklists should be used to prevent failure. He goes on to say there are two causes of failure- ignorance and ineptitude. Checklists won't help ignorance, education and experience fixes that. But checklists can prevent ineptitude. Every woodcock hunter knows darn well that you don't hunt woodcock with a full choke because their mom or dad taught them to use an open or skeet choke. But ineptitude can cause you to forget to change the choke in your shotgun after the end of turkey season. That is where checklists come in to play for the hunter.



Now I know that some of you seasoned hunters are already shaking your heads just like my hunting buddies do when I pull out my trusty bird hunting checklist. Do we really need to get so serious about bird hunting and all of the other fun non-work stuff we do? Let me ask you- can you tell me right now which chokes are in your favorite upland gun? Where is

your compass or the spare batteries for your flashlight, your forceps for pulling quills? I have separate checklists for bird hunting, turkey hunting, and waterfowl. I designed one for going to the range and another for going to a local NAVHDA chapter training day. Another is just for when my wife and I travel with the dogs. I've created some of my own from scratch and others, I have found on the internet and then modified to my own liking. Using a checklist becomes habit. And it is easy.



A checklist really starts by sitting down and developing a list of stuff you need to do and need to bring for whatever the event is. The trick is to make it a working document. That means you should keep it with you, write additions and deletions on it and then save it. My first hunting checklist was hand written and edited many times. I kept it in a one gallon zip-lock and brought it with me. Now I keep them electronically in a folder titled "checklists" in my laptop and print one out before I start packing. On my last hunting trip to South Dakota we encountered lots of snow and cold (apparently referred to as a "polar vortex"). After returning from the trip I added "mushers wax" on the dog section of my Bird Hunting Checklist.

Checklists are personal. I have shown an example below of one of mine, but what works for one per-

son may not necessarily work for another. Some people prefer detailed checklists- others general categories. One person might simply include shotgun as an item on the list while others (like me) must put separate items for the gun, checking the chokes and tools to fix it.

While it may seem that creating the checklist and following it takes even more time, I would suggest that it becomes habit and saves time. As we age, we are more apt to forget things and even more

Impatient when we get to where we are going and realize we forgot a key item—like socks! A hunting buddy loves to rib me by asking when we go hunting if I remembered to bring the checklist. Ha ha that's funny! Then the next day he asks to borrow my duct tape.

OK I recognize that checklists are not for everyone but they sure can make life easier and less stressful. This is particularly true when you have a hunting trip to get ready for and others in your family may not be as sensitive about the time necessary to prepare. Checklists save prep time. Some family members seem to think we have too much stuff and that is the problem. But you and I know that is hardly the truth. Rather we don't have enough stuff (subject of a future article) and we need lots of time to get organized. So do your family and friends a favor and start using a checklist.

Cold Feet?

Den asked me to do a quick piece on “Mushers Wax” after I sent in a photo of ‘Gunny’ hunting in South Dakota last year during the “Polar Vortex” in November. Let me state I know preciously little about the use of Mushers wax but would like to learn more so perhaps this stimulates some discussion.

After hunting for a week in shirts leaves, mother nature descended from the polar region and brought some amount of snow and temperatures between -8 F to a balmy 14 F with 20-35 MPH winds for the last 8 days of our South Dakota pheasant trip. I say “some amount of snow” because the wind blows so much out there that any suggestion of measuring it is ridiculous—it was anywhere from bare ground to 4 foot drifts at the ditches and hedge rows. Gunny hates snow/ice balls in the pads of his feet and my hunting checklist did not include mushers wax (it does now) and so my hunting buddy from Montana lent me some and showed me how he uses it.

His system was really simple. Scoop a handful out of the can with gloved hands and smear it all over the pads, between the toes and over the top of the foot. The wax is the consistency of Bag Balm, something we northern hunters should be familiar with, hence a reason to wear exam gloves so you don’t get the greasy wax all over your gear. It did not seem to have much of an odor and the dogs are so focused on hunting I never saw any of them licking at it or bothered by it at all. **It certainly seemed to prevent snow/ice balls from forming under the pads of the eight or nine dogs we hunted over during the course of the cold week.** By the end of the day it was worn off and we never had to re-apply it during the day.



Of course I am a skeptic so I wandered through the internet for problems and concerns. A sometimes good place to find the negatives is through product reviews. The Musher’s Secret brand, which is what we used, did not reveal any significant concerns. It was rated on Amazon between 4 and 5 stars. The few bad reviews almost exclusively came from the non-sporting crowd who were using it for chapped pads among other purposes. Concerns were related to leaving greasy marks on floors; failure to prevent irritation from road salt; lapping at the feet; and my favorite, “...*purchased this for my boxer who is 11 yrs old, his paw pads are dry and he slips on our wood floors constantly. This did not seem to help at all and he is not crazy about me putting it on him...almost like it bothers him when I apply it. I am very disappointed.*”

We did not find greasy marks on the floors when we came home. Admittedly we were not staying in 5 star accommodations but the wax seemed to be pretty much worn off from hunting. The price is reasonable, about \$18.00 for a can. We used lots over several days and still had some left. I look forward to member feedback as I am certain others have way more experience than we do and there are likely other more common products that may be cheaper or more effective.
